Parts of Speech and Usage

Section Objectives:

- Students will be able to identify and properly use parts of speech in written and spoken communication.
- Practice the behaviors of effective, active listeners.
- Students will be able identify literary and stylistic elements such as imagery, irony, tone and point of view and explain how they create meaning in a story.

Adverb Clauses

Adverb clauses are dependent clauses that act as adverbs. They answer the questions when, where, why, how and to what extent.

The whole adverb clause can also modify the predicate in the independent clause or the whole independent clause.

Adverb clauses are introduced by <u>subordinate conjunctions</u>, such as after, although, as, as if, as long as, as though, because, before, if, in order that, provided that, since, so that, than, though, unless, until, when, whenever, where, wherever, whether, and while.

<u>Punctuation</u>: All introductory adverbial clauses are followed by a comma if the adverb clause comes at the beginning of the sentence. If they adverb clause comes at the end of the sentence, no punctuation is used.
