Grammar Review: Prepositions

A preposition is a word used to show the relation of a noun or pronoun to some other word in the sentence.

In the following sentences, the prepositions are shown in boldfaced type.

The words that the prepositions connect are italicized.

The first *woman* **on** the *list* is my mother.

Her cousin will work in Pittsburgh next year.

The *five* **of** *us* worked *hard* **for** *days*.

Object of the Preposition / Prepositional Phrase

A prepositional phrase begins with a <u>preposition</u> and ends with a noun or pronoun, called the <u>object of the preposition</u>.

In the following examples, the **preposition** is in boldface type. The **object of the preposition** is italicized.

We sat **on** the *fence*.

During *class*, I became sick.

We looked **through** the *window* quickly.
